## **Campus COVID Status**

#### Off-campus testing data reason behind last week's jump in cases

Last Thursday, Sept. 24, U-M reported a significant increase in positive cases, but that was *mainly because the data included students tested at off-campus facilities*. The U-M COVID-19 dashboard now reflects new datasets, including outside testing from Washtenaw County. The majority of the cases stem from clusters involving students living in off-campus, congregate residences. U-M reported no new clusters within the residence halls. All known positive cases and close contacts have been moved into quarantine and isolation.

\*\*\*Note that to our knowledge, there are NO positive cases in MSE labs.\*\*\*






#### **Self-erasing chips (video)**

### We need your vote!

U-M is participating in the <u>Big Ten Voting</u> <u>Challenge</u>. This is a non-partisan effort to increase student voter participation in all elections. The average student voter rate across the Big Ten Conference spiked to 43 percent for the 2018 midterm elections, surpassing the national average student voting rate of 40 percent, and more than doubling the national student voting rate of 19 percent in 2014. The goal is to increase U-M student voter turnout even more for this upcoming election.
